9 Ebersole Holly Garden

This is the very first garden designed and created in the Sandhills Horticultural Gardens collection of gardens. It boasts multiple different species and hundreds of cultivars of hollies.

Margaret H. Ambrose Japanese Garden
Focused on bringing out the essence of nature in
harmony with human intervention, this garden
features an entry bridge overlooking a dry creek bed, a
Tsukubai (stone basin and drip fountain), a Karensansui

(dry garden), and an Azumaya (viewing shelter).

Atkins Hillside Garden

A man-made, winding river-rock stream with waterfalls and pools, a butterfly garden, the Falls Overlook, and a gazebo surrounded by diverse plant specimens are featured in this garden.

Butterfly Garden

Nestled within the Atkins Hillside Garden, the Butterfly Garden features a mix of ornamental and native annuals and perennials. Plants are selected for their nectar and ability to support caterpillars.

Succulent Garden

Cacti and succulents not native to this area flourish in a unique microclimate created by the stucco walls of the garden.

Sir Walter Raleigh Garden

Designed and constructed in 1984 to commemorate the attempted colonization of Roanoke Island in 1584, this formal English Garden exhibits several smaller gardens, including the Holly Maze, the Fountain Courtyard, the Sunken Garden, the Ceremonial Courtyard, and the Herb Garden.

Conifer Garden

This fine collection features varieties of slow-growing conifers that reflect color, form and texture of foliage not often viewed in the Southern states.

Annual Garden

Each year, the students of the Landscape Gardening program introduce a different surprise theme for this ever-changing garden.

7 Perennial Border

The Perennial Border, located outside the Sir Walter Raleigh Gardens, features a mix of herbaceous perennials, flowering bulbs and ornamental grasses, this area offers a vibrant, year-round display of color and texture that complements the surrounding gardens.
